Session Snapshots

2008 Conference Theme — 21st Century Terrorism and its Impact on Security and Privacy

Terrorism in Canada — Stewart Bell is a senior reporter at the National Post and the author of two books on terrorism; the national bestseller *Cold Terror* and *The Martyr's Oath*. Bell's extensive insight and investigative journalism into current conditions will be shared in his presentation on terrorism in Canada.

Cyber Terrorism — Patrick Gray, senior security strategist for Cisco Systems, has first-hand knowledge of the hacking community as a result of his previous service with the FBI and the Internet Threat Intelligence Center. His presentation will examine how the Internet landscape has changed; what used to be a playground for hackers, crackers and script kiddies is now a borderless abyss of organized crime fuelled by financial gain.

Terrorist Funding Through Cyber Fraud — Ron Plesco, CEO of the National Cyber Forensic Training Alliance Foundation, is a nationally-renowned information security and privacy attorney with 14 years experience in information assurance/privacy, identity management and computer crime law. His presentation will discuss and demo the current hacking methods and fraud schemes employed by organized crime and terrorist groups to exploit financial infrastructure.

The Terrorist Threat Facing Canada — Brian Rumig is the director general for the Prairie region CSIS offices. His 22-year career with CSIS has been primarily focused on the investigation and assessment of the terrorism threats facing Canada.

Jihadist Use of the Internet — Tate Nurkin, Jane's Strategic Advisory Services, has 11 years experience in research and analysis of the international security environment including emerging threats and interests/assets for intelligence and defense communities. His presentation will provide insight into the existing and emerging nature of the radical Islamic on-line community.

Privacy Auditing and Its Impacts — Trevor Shaw, Office of the Privacy Commissioner of Canada, has spent the past 30 years auditing Canadian government departments and agencies as well as privacy management systems and practices. His presentation will examine the challenges to privacy in a world of heightened security and ubiquitous computing. He will also discuss what the Office of the Privacy Commissioner of Canada is doing in the area of national security.

Terrorism in Canada: Perspectives from a Canadian Victim — Susheel Gupta is a former federal prosecutor who worked on many Canadian computer crime "firsts." He is also the director of the Air India Victims Families Association (he lost his mother in the Air India terrorism bombing). Currently, he is tasked to a number of security and terrorism issues.

The Global Jihadist Threat — Learn how to understand the thinking of the Islamic Jihadist and how to counter the threat within your agencies, organizations and communities. Majid Hassam is the president of CAPIT (Center Against the Proliferation of International Terrorism). With 25 years of experience in the security industry dedicated to the areas of counter terrorism, counter intelligence and computer forensics, Hassam teaches computer forensics at the American Academy of Applied Forensics and also serves on the board of advisors for the academy.

Information Sharing Between Public and Private Sector — Dennis Huot is the manager of the Alberta Security and Strategic Intelligence Support Team (ASSIST), a provincial government unit responsible for the delivery of the Alberta Counter Terrorism Crisis Management Plan. His presentation will examine the role of ASSIST in facilitating multi-agency information sharing in Alberta including challenges and barriers, information sharing best practices and the benefits of information/intelligence sharing between the public and private sectors.

Countering the Threat — Terrorism is not just a federal or foreign concept; it is only manageable if it is tackled at the grass roots level. Lynda Howes, Calgary Police Service, will examine everyone's valuable role (including the public, the police, government and private industry) in recognizing the potential indicators of terrorism and what actions to take if, and when, we encounter them.

Terrorism. Why in Canada? — Royston Colbourne, CanPro Global

The Security-Privacy Paradox — Robert Parker will present this session examining the current approach to personal information, threat/risk classification and protection. Specifically, he will discuss and provide guidance to achieve an appropriate balance between protecting an individual's personal information and protecting society against terrorism.
